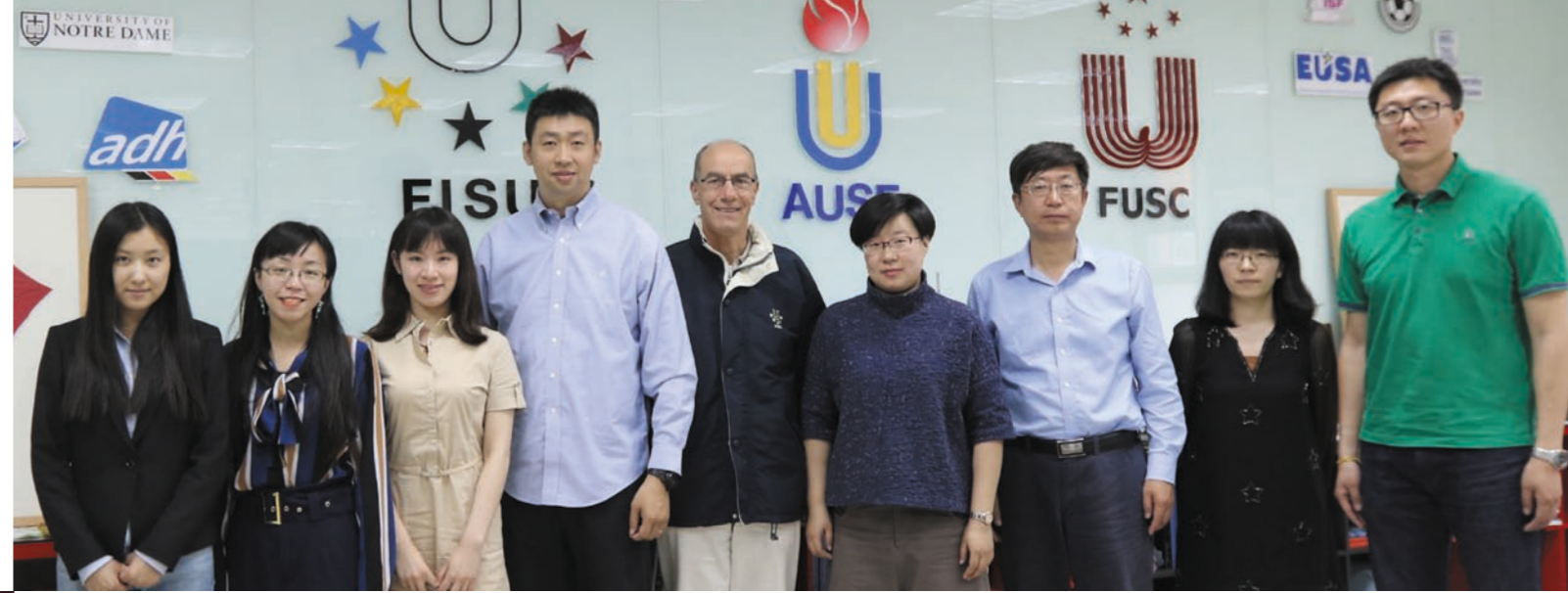

# AUSF Activities 2016

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Asian University Futsal Championship was held from April 23<sup>rd</sup> to 29<sup>th</sup>, 2016 in Almaty, Kazakhstan. The championship was jointly hosted by Ministry of Education and Sciences of the Republic of Kazakhstan and University Sports Federation of Kazakhstan. More than 150 athletes from 7 countries, i.e. China, Iran, Kyrgyzstan, Mongolia, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan and Kazakhstan participated and fought for their national glory. The host Kazakhstan sent two teams, one national team and one university team, showing great determination to get the champion.

On April 23<sup>rd</sup>, the Grand Opening was held in the Baluan Sholak

Sports Palace, which also served as the competition venue of the games. The stadium was fully occupied with futsal fans. All the players marched in the field in their uniforms accompanied by warm applause from the audiences. Mr. Kairat Zakiryanov, President of the National University Sports Federation of Kazakhstan, Mr. Lekerov Kuandik, Advisor of the Minister of Education and Science, Mr. Ha Woong Yong, AUSF Representative welcomed all the teams and wished good luck to the players. After the ceremony, freestyle football dancers showed their exquisite skills and entertained the audiences. In the preliminary round, the 8 teams were divided into 2 groups.

Group A included Kazakhstan national team, Tajikistan team, China team and Mongolia team, while Iran team, Kazakhstan university team, Turkmenistan team and Kyrgyzstan team were in Group B. The top two teams from each group would enter the semifinals, and then the winners would meet in the final. On each competition day, 4 wonderful matches were presented.

After 3 intensive competition days, two Kazakhstan teams, Iran team and Tajikistan team entered the semifinal. After two cruel knock-out matches, Kazakhstan national team and Iran team successfully met in the final. Despite the host owned great cheerleading supporters, Iran took the full



control of the game. A total of 12 scores were made solely by Iranian team. Hence, Iranian team boasted the overwhelming victory and also managed to defend the title in Asian University Futsal Championship.

On April 29<sup>th</sup>, Closing Ceremony was held just after the final. The inviting traditional Kazakh folk song "Balbyrauyn" were performed by the national orchestra. Ms. Roza Karimzhanova, the Vice Minister from Ministry of Education and Science of Kazakhstan, Mr. Ha Woong Yong, AUSF Representative and Mr. Kairat Zakiryanov, President of Kazakhstan University Sports Federation awarded the top 3 teams respectively and thanked all the participants for their support.

In 2017, the Asian-Oceanian University Futsal Championship will be held in Yinchuan, China from 16<sup>th</sup> to 26<sup>th</sup> September. The strong teams from FISU-Oceania will be invited to compete and communicate with Asian university teams. Expect their wonderful and excellent performance!

## 1<sup>st</sup> Asian University Boxing Championship



From 3<sup>rd</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> May 2016, in the venue of "Sports Complex of 20<sup>th</sup> Year Anniversary of Independence" in Dushanbe, Tajikistan, 68 Boxers representing 9 countries, namely Afghanistan, Iran, Japan, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Mongolia, Thailand, Turkmenistan and Tajikistan, participated in the inaugural Asian University Boxing Championship. The championship included men's tournament with 10 categories and women's tournament with 3 categories. The main competition hall which can accommodate nearly 2,000 people was fully occupied every day.

It was the first international university championship in Tajikistan and the first boxing championship of AUSF. On the occasion of the celebration of "25<sup>th</sup> Year Anniversary of Independence", this championship was the best gift for the country and people. Thanks to the dedication and commitment of Tajikistan Ministry of Education, the Committee of Youth Affairs, Tajikistan Sports and Tourism, especially the Organizing Committee, the championship was a great success. All the matches were live broadcasted by the TV stations. As we were aware, the

6 national TV stations broadcasted the Championship every day from different perspectives. The wide promotion of this Championship made that week a boxing festival for the entire nation. The cultural activities were one of the highlights of this Championship. As interviewed, one of the student athletes from Afghanistan told us that his team was well received by the Tajikistan University. The university invited the team to visit the museum, knowing the culture of Tajikistan, to taste the local food, organize exchanges program with local university students and cheer for the Afghanistan team no matter who they competed with. He said the students and faculties made him feel at home. He was touched by their hospitality. As we were told, each local university was assigned with the responsibility to take care of one participating team. As interview, one staff from the Tajikistan Medical University told us that his university was responsible for the Kazakhstan

team. Even when Kazakhstan student competed with Tajikistan student, he could not help cheering for the Kazakhstan student. You can see, besides the competition, more could be gained via sports. After 5 fierce competition days, Tajikistan delegation won the Champion of team events with 7 gold, 9 silver and 7 bronze, followed by Kazakhstan team who won 3 gold, 1 silver and 2 bronze medals. Kyrgyzstan team won the third place with 1 gold, 1 silver and 1 bronze. Lastly, AUSF would also like to appreciate all the student athletes, teachers, coaches and referees, who were real sport ambassadors. Their courageous fighting and great manners has left the Tajikistan people a good memory.

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Asian University 3x3 Basketball Championship

Successfully hosting the 1<sup>st</sup> AUSF 3x3 Basketball Championship in Shenyang, China in 2015 initiated a good start for the brand new AUSF event. Macau China took over the flag in 2016 and hosted the 2<sup>nd</sup> edition. 116 officials and athletes from 12 countries and regions, namely, Brunei, China, Hong Kong China, Indonesia, Iran, Korea, Malaysia, Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Chinese Taipei, and Macau China, competed for the title of Champions. 12 men's teams were split into two pools, while 10 women's teams were

divided into two pools. The games were played at the main gym of University of Macau and it had attracted many spectators even though the university was closed for summer holidays. In return, the teams did not let their fans down by playing with high intensity and quality.

Payame Noor University of Iran, as the only undefeated team throughout the championship clinched the men's title over the home team University of Macau with the score of 21-16. In the

bronze medal game, Civil Aviation University of China crashed over Hong Kong Polytechnic University with the final score of 21-17.

In the women's final game, top contender Peking University took an easy win over Sripatum University of Thailand to secure the champion. The most breathtaking game was the fight for the third place, in which Tianjin University of Finance and Economics (TUF) had a tough game with Team Thailand B, and went into overtime. Finally, the

forward from TUF made two decisive free throws, helping her team to grab the bronze medal.

The top two teams from each tournament (men's and women's) were qualified to the 2<sup>nd</sup> FISU World University 3x3 Basketball League held in Xiamen in October. The top 16 university teams from the world of each tournament (men's and women's) would gather together to fight for the world university titles. Besides, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Asian University 3x3 Basketball Championship, also the qualifier of 3<sup>rd</sup> FISU World University 3x3 Basketball League, will be held in 2017. See you the next year!

## 3<sup>rd</sup> Asian University Football Championship



The 3<sup>rd</sup> Asian University Football Championship (AUFC) was held in Taebaek city, Korea from 1<sup>st</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> September 2016. Approximately 350 players of 12 teams from nine countries and regions, namely China, Hong Kong China, Iran, Japan, Malaysia, Myanmar, Oman, Chinese Taipei and Korea participated in this championship with their full passion and experiences. Each of them represented the highest university level in its country or region.

It was the first time for Asian University Football Federation (AUFF) to host AUSF football event. The previous Asian

University Football Championship was held in Wuhan, China 7 years ago, so all the teams were excited and happy to meet again. Aiming to discover and develop university football, to provide an opportunity for university players to experience the best university championship in Asia, the 3<sup>rd</sup> AUFC lasted for 7 days. Although the weather in Taebaek city was windy, cold and rainy, the participating team players fought fearlessly and presented very competitive and marvelous matches. The final of the championship was between Iran and Japan B team with the highest performances, which

was live broadcasted by Korean Broadcast Station.

AUFF was established in June 2015 in Seoul, Korea, aiming to develop university football in Asia, and to encourage university students who would like to achieve their dreams through football. In the hope to promote the development of football amongst Asian University students and to provide Asian young football players with a platform to compete with each other, an MOU aiming to jointly promote the development of football amongst Asian university students by organizing competitions and

educational training programs related to sports for university students and sports officials in Asia was signed between AUSF and AUFF. According to the MOU, AUFF would host AUFC in consecutive 3 years (2016-2018) in Korea or some other Asian countries or regions. It is the brand new cooperation for AUSF and a new model has been set.

On this occasion, AUSF and AUFF would like to express sincere gratitude to Taebaek city and Taebaek Football Confederation, without whose generous dedication and efforts, the championship could not be such a success.

The next Asian University Football Championship was scheduled to be organized in Korea in 2017 again.

From September 6<sup>th</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup>, 80 players and 34 officials composing 7 teams from China, Mongolia, Hong Kong China, Macau China, Korea, Thailand, and the host Chinese Taipei competed in this groundbreaking event.

"Since established in 1992, AUSF has been dedicated to promote different activities for students in Asia," said AUSF Assessor Preecha PRAYOONPAT, "we are gratifying to witness the first ever women's basketball championship." Mr. Lee Hong-chi, CTUSF Deputy Secretary-General said in his welcoming speech, "we are happy to host this inaugural and remarkable event, and wish every team play well and have good time in Taipei".

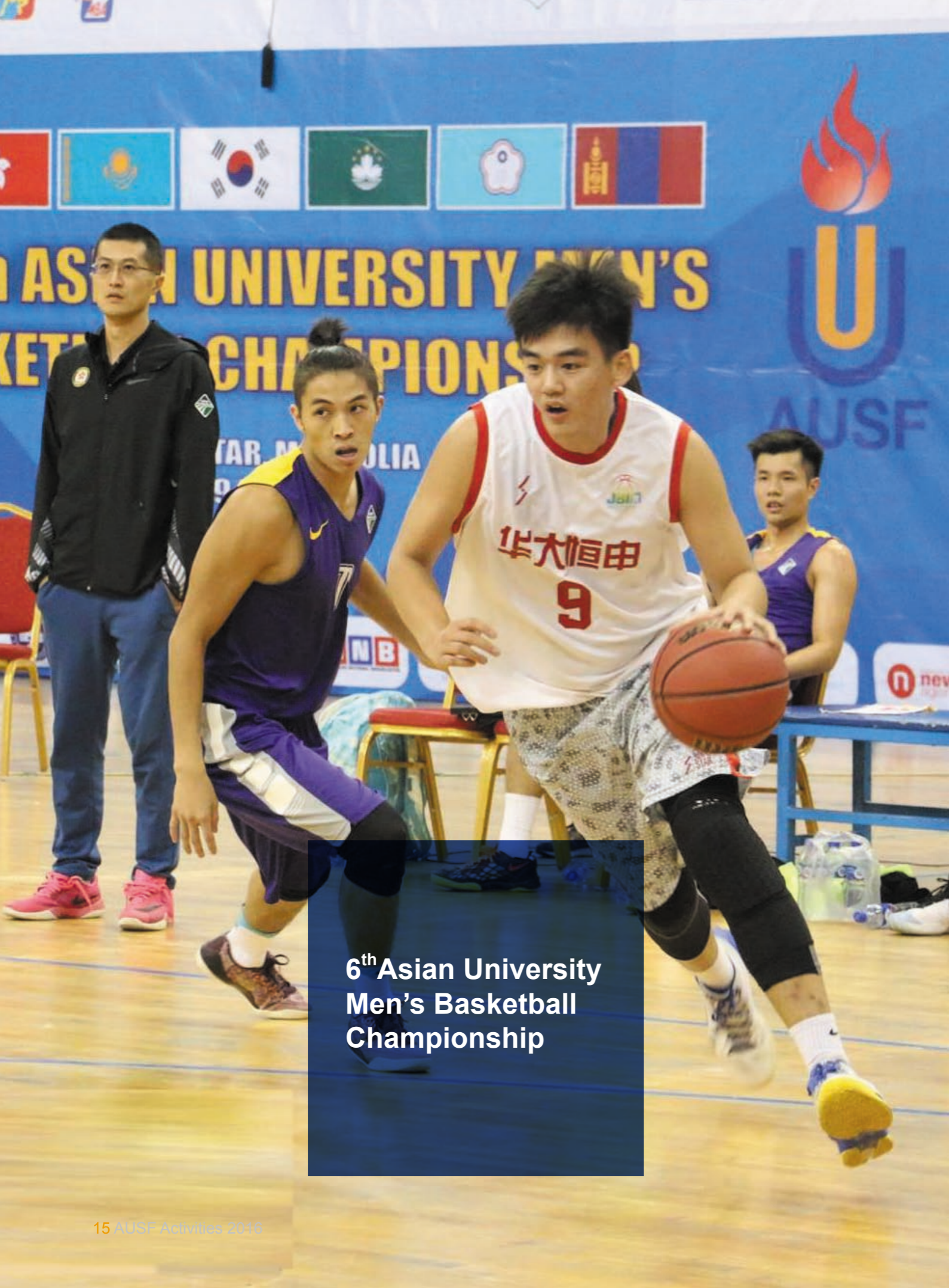

**6<sup>th</sup> Asian University Men's Basketball Championship**



As one of the AUSF flagship events, Asian University Men's Basketball Championship has been held for 5 consecutive times in Chinese Taipei from 2004-2014. This year, the 6<sup>th</sup> edition came to Mongolia. From 19<sup>th</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> September, 97 participants from 7 countries and regions, namely China, Hong Kong China, Kazakhstan, Korea, Macau China, Chinese Taipei and host Mongolia, competed with each other on this arena. Most teams took this championship as an important test and practice for 2017 Taipei Summer Universiade.

Before the competition, on 14<sup>th</sup> September, the Organizing Committee hosted the on-line draw lot under the supervision of Technical Delegate, which was lively broadcasted via Facebook page of "Mongolian Student Sports Federation". The 7 teams were divided into 2 groups. China and Chinese Taipei, as the Gold and Silver medalists of the 5<sup>th</sup> edition, headed the Group A and Group B respectively. Hong Kong China and Korea were grouped in Pool A, while Kazakhstan, Mongolia and Macau China were grouped in Pool B. Preliminary matches were held at the National Basketball Palace of Khandgait Village, while semi-final and final matches were organized in Buyant-Ukhaa Sports Palace with better facilities.

The Opening Ceremony took place on 19<sup>th</sup> September. Local

audiences fully occupied the arena and all were very excited since it was the first international university basketball event held in Ulaanbaatar. Some even drove 50km away to watch the games. All 7 teams marched in the alphabetic order with the guidance of the lovely Mongolian children dressed in traditional costume. At the end of the Opening Ceremony, OC prepared marvelous cultural performances with local traditional characteristics. Four local artists performed the fantastic Mongolian traditional folk. Their special throat singing "Huummi" was really impressive and amazing. All the players were astonished at the melodious sounds.

The championship lasted for 5 days. After 3-day preliminary competition, Hong Kong China and China from Group A, Chinese Taipei and Mongolia from Group B were qualified for the semi-finals. Both Mongolia and Chinese Taipei defeated their opponents and met on the final. The host swept his opponent by fast attacks and won the champion.

6 players were awarded for their excellence and contribution to their teams: Best Center- Zheng Yi from China; Best Shooting Guard- Tsai Chou Kwan from Hong Kong China; Best Forward -Huang Tsang-Chun from Chinese Taipei; Best Point Guard - Lee Kai Yan from Chinese Taipei; Best Forward -Temuujin Ariunbold from Mongolia and the MVP went

to Dulguun Enkhbat from the champion team.

As one of the highlights, on 20<sup>th</sup> September, all the participants were invited to celebrate the first International Day of University Sports. All the athletes were dressed in FISU T-shirts and marched in a row. Mr. Jargalsaikhan, AUSF Assessor and Secretary General of Mongolian Students Sports Federation, gave a celebrating speech to all student athletes, he pointed out the students players were today's stars in the basketball court, and through sport they were able to explore a larger world, which could help them to be tomorrow's leaders. A large celebratory cake with the logo of #IDUS2016 was shared accompanied by FISU anthem.

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Asian University Road Cycling Championship

From 14<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> October 2016, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Asian University Road Cycling Championship was held in Chang-Nyeong, Korea, which was the second AUC Cycling in Chang-Nyeong, Korea. Chang Nyeong County is famous for the hot spring, which attracts most national teams of different sports to set up training base here. 41 athletes and 22 officials from China, Japan, Malaysia, Mongolia and Korea participated in the event, competing and showing their talents in Criterium and Individual Road Race.

## 9<sup>th</sup> AUSF General Assembly

From 20<sup>th</sup> - 21<sup>st</sup> November, the 9<sup>th</sup> AUSF General Assembly was held in Xiamen, China. Over 120 participants from nearly 50 countries and regions, including FISU President Oleg MATYTSIN, 1st Vice President Leonz EDER, Vice President YANG Ligu, Treasurer Bayasgalan DANZANDORJ, Secretary General/CEO Eric SAINTROD, special guests from other Continental Federations and AUSF member federations were present at the meeting.



Presided over by AUSF Secretary General Kenny CHOW, the meeting began with the welcome speech from FUSC (Federation of University Sports of China) Executive Vice President and Secretary General YANG Ligu, who is also FISU Vice President. He warmly welcomed all the participants, and reiterated that China would like to continue to strive for the development of Asian university sports federation. In the following, FISU President Oleg MATYTSIN delivered his congratulatory speech, highly praised the contribution Asia made toward world university sports movement by virtue of hosting 6 summer Universiades and 1 winter Universiade in the past 16 years and 9 out of 33 world university championships this year. In particular, he

appreciated China's great efforts made to the international university sports movement by hosting the 1st World University Climbing Championship, World University 3x3 Leagues, as well as the ongoing World University 3x3 Basketball Championship, etc. He expected stronger working relations to be established after the new AUSF EC election. As the counterparts of AUSF, representatives of EUSA, FASU, FISU-AMERICA and FISU-OCEANIA also attended the



meeting, wishing the Assembly smooth and fruitful.

Following the meeting Agenda, Kenny CHOW made his report by reviewing the achievements made in this term 2010-2016, with regard to a good number of competitions and events, educational programs and interactive activities. He highly acknowledged AUSF Secretariat's and member federations' dedication and contribution towards the Asian university sports prosperity. Treasurer SEETOW Cheng Fave reviewed the income and expenditure of the years 2014-2016 and critically analyzed the current situation of AUSF finance by pinpointing a few inadequacies, which was followed by Auditor HA Woong Yong's reports of 2014-2015.

One of the key items was the approval of the proposed amendments to the AUSF constitution. AUSF Constitution was first approved in 2007 and it was the first time for AUSF to review numerous content amendments, regarding the recognition of NUSF, composition of Executive Committee, etc. Echoing a call for the contemporary situation, the revision of rules and regulations provided AUSF with better criteria for future actions, which will help AUSF board members and the Secretariat better serve member countries and regions, universities and student athletes. In addition, the affiliation of Afghanistan and Bhutan increased the number of AUSF members to 38, which made AUSF a bigger family.

On 21<sup>st</sup> November, the main agenda was on the election of new board. 25 out of 38 AUSF members present, together with 5 proxies received, elected the new board for a term of 6 years from 2016-2022. To make sure the election was going on in a fair manner, 3 Scrutineers were nominated, namely Mr. HJ Muhamad Mohd HANIF (MAS), Mr. FENG Jinwen (CHN) who was the legal consultant and Ms. Gulbaram KULAKHMETOVA (KAZ). Besides, Mr. Laurent BERIEL from FISU and Mr. Martin DULTON, the President of FISU-Oceania were invited to monitor the election proceeding. The new board was composed of the following:

## FISU-CUSF Strategic Dialogue

From 22<sup>nd</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup> November, the FISU-CUSF Strategic Dialogue was held in Xiamen, China. It was initiated to strengthen the link between FISU and Continental University Sports Federations, and to promote mutual understanding amongst all stakeholders. Being the very first time in both FISU and AUSF history, the dialogue attracted over 100 audiences from more than 40 countries and regions. The main theme of the Dialogue was "University Sports: Direction and Dynamics".

The Dialogue was on-line live broadcasted by "JSPORT". According to the record, more than 100,000 viewers watched the Dialogue and interacted with the keynote speakers present. The dialogue was hosted by Mr. ZHONG Bingshu, President of Capital University of Physical Education and Sports, who is also the member of FISU Education Committee and Vice President of FUSC. FISU president Oleg MATYTSIN, 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President Leonz EDER, Treasurer Bayasgalan DANZANDORJ, Secretary General Eric SAINTROND, AUSF President

Mr. XUE Yanqing, Senior Vice President Omar AL-HAI, Secretary General Kenny CHOW, Chairman of the Board and Founder of Hupu Sports CHENG Hang, to name just a few, were present. On behalf of AUSF, Mr. XUE Yanqing welcomed all the delegates and audiences. He said this Dialogue would serve as an important vehicle to connect FISU, CUSF and NUSF.

Mr. Oleg MATYTSIN delivered an official speech, praised Asia for the contribution in both Olympic movement and university sports movement. He emphasized that it is the national university sport federations who shape the direction of FISU. He affirmed that creating a more positive cooperation between FISU, NUSF and CUSF has been a priority in FISU's working plan. He said this Dialogue would be spread to the other continents.

The Dialogue was composed of 3 Plenaries with different themes. The Plenary I was themed with "Direction on the Development of University Sport", presented by 4 speakers, including Mr.

Leonz EDER, Mr. Bayasgalan DANZANDORJ, FISU CDSU Director Laurent BRIEL and Mr. Kenny CHOW. Their visionary share and insightful opinions has intrigued heated discussion.

"Dynamics of University Sports Development" was the theme of Plenary II, mainly concerning funding opportunities and new media. FISU Secretary General/ CEO Mr. Eric Saintrond, Vice President of Federation of University Sports of China, AUSF President Mr. XUE Yanqing, Chairman of the Board and Founder of Hupu Sports Mr. CHENG Hang and Deputy Vice Chancellor of MARA University of Technology Mr. Abdullah Mohamad Said shared their expert views in different perspectives.

On the afternoon, parallel workshops on development of university sports in 5 sub-regions, including Central Asia, East Asia, South Asia, Southeast Asia and West Asia, were held in order to better understand the challenges and difficulties faced in different regions.



On 23<sup>rd</sup> November, reports of parallel workshops were shared to all the audience. AUSF Vice President Mr. JARGALSALKHAN D. reported on the establishment and membership of AUSF member federations in Central Asia. A more active trend was presented by increasing championships and Universiades in recent years among this area. Central Asian countries get more and more involved in the diversity of university sports events with the help of various funding resources.

AUSF President Mr. XUE Yanqing's presentation of East Asia mainly concentrated on such concerns as media and material exchange, communication network, FISU-CUSF dialogue mechanism, funding for participation as well as organization of events for FISU/ AUSF.

As for South Asia, AUSF Treasurer Mr. SEETOW Cheng Fave pointed out the imbalanced development of university sports development in this area. To narrow down the gap between countries, a suggestion of an inspection visit to those countries lacking in passion, short in facilities and scarce for personnel was proposed.

Mr. Abdullah Mohamad Said, Deputy Vice Chancellor of MARA University of Technology summarized their discussion in Southeast Asia. A large number of hot issues were reported, especially in case of funding by the government, relationships

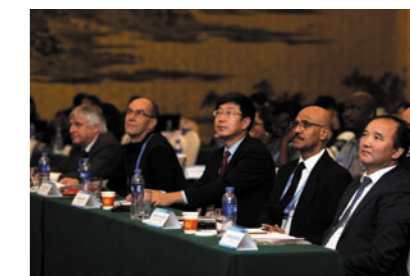


between NSFs, national Olympic bodies, government agencies, universities, stakeholders, regional/continental federations and FISU.

Last but not least, AUSF Senior Vice President Mr. AL-HAI Omar summarized the talk on west Asia. Geographically adjacent to Europe and Africa, this region bridged the East and the West, attracting more attention from neighboring CUSFs (i.e., EUSA) or international organizations (i.e., FISU). With the increasing number of university students being encouraged to participate in international sport events, the NUSFs gradually perform better function among Asian countries.

The Plenary III with the theme of "Good Practice of Sports Management at Continental Level" was contributed by 5 speakers, including EUSA Secretary General Mr. Matjaz PECOVNIK, AUSC Secretary General Mr. HANIF Muhamad Mohd Bin, Arabic USF Mr. AL-HAI A. Omar, FISU Oceania President Mr. DOULTON Martin and KUFC representative Ms. Uranbileg Zorigoo. Good practices of sports administration, staff management, secretariat structure, marketing platform, volunteer and internship programs, development funding, exhibition and fair play promotion were elaborated.

This strategic dialogue was concluded successfully and fruitfully. Through the dialogue, the FISU-CUSF-NUSF cooperation was consolidated and communication channels



were dredged. As supported and commented by FISU, AUSF set a good example for other continents. The Dialogue, as one of the fixed calendar, will be held every the other year. A brighter future could be expected for the international university sports movement!

**Student Sports Federation of the Republic of Kazakhstan**

Kazakhstan Student Sport Federation (Kazakhstan NUSF) actively promoted the development of university sports in Kazakhstan as well as in Central Asia this year. Six years ago, Kazakhstan was attributed the right to host the 28<sup>th</sup> World Winter Universiade in Almaty in 2017. **Singapore Successfully Hosted the 18<sup>th</sup> ASEAN University Games 2016 in Celebration of Diversity and Unity!**

After 22 years, ASEAN University Games came to Singapore again. This was only Singapore's third time playing host apart from the 4<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> edition of the Games in 1986 and 1994 respectively. From 10 to 17 July 2016, ASEAN countries university students got together in the "Loin City" for their own game. AUG is a biennial University Games participated by ASEAN community countries, which includes Singapore, Malaysia, Vietnam, Laos, Thailand, Indonesia, Cambodia, Myanmar, Philippines, Brunei and Timor Leste. The objectives of AUG are to:

- Promote ASEAN solidarity in our youths through school sports;
  - Provide opportunities for school athletes to benchmark their sporting talents in the ASEAN region; and
  - Provide opportunities for school athletes to interact and engage in cultural exchange within ASEAN.
- At this year's AUG, Singapore welcomed a total of 1900 athletes and officials from 11 ASEAN countries to compete in 16 sports. Host Singapore offered all 8 compulsory sports – Athletics, Badminton, Swimming, Table Tennis, Basketball, Football, Sepak Takraw and Volleyball – and 8 optional sports – Archery, Canoeing, Fencing, Pencak Silat, Shooting, Pentaque, Rugby 7s and Water Polo. It is the first time that Canoeing, Rugby 7s and Water Polo are competed at AUG. The Games was officially opened



on 10 July by Singapore's Minister of Education (Higher Education and Skills), Mr. Ong Ye Kung. In his opening speech, Minister Ong encouraged all athletes and officials to build friendship regardless of the differences. He said, "It is only in sports that we can fight with no hostility, only in sports that we find victory in defeat, only in sports where one can do battle and remain friends". It certainly resonated with AUG's objective as a platform for interaction and exchange through sports. In line with the theme "In Celebration of Diversity and Unity", the Opening Ceremony concert was lined up with exciting performances ranging from laser shows and energetic modern performances to traditional and cultural performances by students from various universities in



Singapore. The athletes and officials also took an oath to display sportsmanship through fair play and performing to their best of abilities and also committing to a doping-free

Games. Indeed, in the next 10 days after the Opening Ceremony, 1500 athletes competed with their best performance. There were tough battles with blood and tears as each fought their hardest for their country. Atipol Suwandee, the assistant manager of Thailand's football team, rightly pointed out that expectations are sky high and winning gold was the sole objective of the team at this year's AUG. He asserted that the success of the team is dependent on every single individual and that includes the supporters. "There are many factors to winning a game and the supporters are a significant factor as they play a big role to boost the morale of the players, and make them feel at home in a foreign country," said Suwandee. For other athletes, being at AUG was about following the footsteps of their accomplished family members who became elite athletes. Della Adisty Handayani, an archer and a business management student at the Airlangga University, is the daughter of Indonesia's first ever Olympic medalist, Lilies Handayani and she hoped one day would be able to represent her nation in the Southeast Asian (SEA) Games.

Beyond just the field of play,



Silver and 35 Bronze medals. With 33 and 27 Gold medals, Indonesia and Malaysia finished 2nd and 3rd respectively. Host Singapore achieved a historical record of 24 Gold medals, putting them in 5th place behind Vietnam of 26 Gold medals. 10 days, 16 sports, 1500 athletes but 1 ASEAN spirit, this is the fabulous 18<sup>th</sup> ASEAN University Games!



athletes and officials were also treated with an educational tour around Singapore. At the tours, they were treated to a feast of local delights and given the opportunity to learn about Singapore's culture and history. Part of the cultural exchange was of course learning the Singapore English also known as Singlish! Ask any AUG athlete and they are sure to use the words like "Shiok!" (means great!) and "...Lah!". However, the learning was not limited to just the foreign athletes, local Singaporean students were also brought on "Behind-the-scenes" tours during the Games to learn on how the event was organized. They also had the opportunity to watch some exciting matches and played an important role as cheerleaders!

Tan Eng Liang also handed over the AUG Flag to the Chairman of the 19th ASEAN University Games, Mr. Thien Win, Director General of Myanmar Department of Higher Education. Apart from celebrating, it should also be time to express gratitude to the 3000 volunteers and workforce who made the Games possible. In the volunteers' tribute video, on behalf of all participants of AUG, Dr. Tan thanked all volunteers for their contribution, enthusiasm and commitment, without which the Games cannot be ever successful.

Finally, the Games came to an end with Thailand leading the medal table with 52 Gold, 34

On 19 July, the Games concluded with an outdoor concert at the National University of Singapore (NUS) Town Green. A total of 1000 athletes, officials and volunteers were marveled at a display of fireworks. Singapore's Senior Minister of State from the Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth, Ms. Sim Ann officiated the ceremony and declared the Games closed. Chairman of the 18th ASEAN University Games Organizing and Vice President of the Singapore National Olympic Council, Dr.

The four-day game included competitions on beach football, beach volleyball and 10 km beach run. All the athletes were accommodated in a 5-star hotel nearby the beach.

Oman participated in beach volleyball and 10 km beach run, and won gold medal and bronze medal respectively. Dr. Al Aرامي, Chairman of Oman NUSF, said "We are very pleased to be in Morocco to participate with our brothers and sisters in the wonderful Game." He also served as Vice President of Arab University Sports Federation, and he drew the blue print of Arab University Sports Federation. 3 Arab University Championships in the odd year and 4 championships in even years would be hosted. ## Convenient and green transportation for athletes

Safe and convenient transportation is a key task during Universiade. Downtown Taipei is equipped with a comprehensive network, including five MRT lines and 117 stations, grid bus lines and public biking system YouBike. These services not only support tourism, but also connect main Universiade venues and popular destinations. All athletes and attending guests will enjoy the most comfortable, safe and sleek transportation experiences. Besides existing transportation networks, designated counters and parking spaces will be available to athletes at airports.



Shuttle buses and 22 bus lines will connect athletes' villages and sports venues. Special platforms, security checks and parking lots will ensure transportation safety for athletes. Athlete shuttle services will operate from August 12<sup>th</sup> to September 2<sup>nd</sup> 2017 to minimize travel time.

## Once-in-a-lifetime tourism and food experiences



Besides sports and competition, Organizing Committee also design various tourism activities for athletes and their families, journalists, judges and VIPs during their stays in Taipei. Among their busy schedules, these signature destinations will offer long-lasting memories for to our guests.

## Green and sustainable venues

Sustainability, environmentally-friendly and energy efficiency are key indicators to Taipei City. The same set of principles apply to Universiade venues and athletes'



village. In preparation process, Taipei City only built two new venues, while utilizing over 50 existing facilities that scatter in New Taipei City, Taoyuan City, Hsinchu County and Hsinchu City as well. Besides cost optimization, it offers better training and sports spaces for local residents and athletes afterwards. New basketball stadium and athletes' villages are both qualified green buildings, emphasizing smart features, low power consumption and low operation costs. Athletes' village is based on public housing projects in Linkou, and returns to original purpose after Universiade, in order to reduce construction and maintenance costs. The village includes 23 buildings and 2,200 units. Main facilities are all green building certification pending. To ensure optimal conditions for athletes, the village offers various services to international delegates, including accommodation, transportation, security, catering, healthcare, culture, entertainment and business. Other spaces are available for warm-ups, fitness, cafeteria, religious activities and gaming. Catering options include European, Asian, Halal, vegetarian and Taiwanese. Prayer and meditation rooms for Bhuddism, Christianity, Catholicism and Islam are located in the village for their health and wellbeing. Cultural experiences, performances and virtual reality

spaces in athletes' village present three main communities here: aboriginal, Hokkien and Hakka. Musical performances in the evening facilitate cultural exchanges.

## FISU Activities



An Overview of the Most Important FISU Activities in 2016

*2016 being an even-numbered year, traditionally announces itself as a "World University Championship" year for FISU where the focus lies on single-sport events next to the traditional multi-sport Winter and Summer Universiades that are FISU's key events in the uneven-numbered years. Indeed, this year no less than 33 single-sport events were scheduled in 26 countries and regions spread over five continents. An even year also means the organization of the FISU Forum. The 13<sup>th</sup> edition took place in Montpellier, France. Furthermore, FISU celebrated 'IDUS', the International Day of University Sport', proclaimed by UNESCO on 20 September.*



the championship programme with Sambo which was hosted in Nicosia, Cyprus for the first time. Sambo previously featured as an optional sport at the 2013 Summer Universiade in Kazan, Russia. Mexico, Poland, Portugal and Italy were the most active members of our federation organizing more than one championship this year.

The Asian member federations of FISU were very active in hosting nine FISU WUCs this year, i.e. 3x3 Basketball and Sport Climbing (CHN), Archery (MGL), Boxing (THA), Chess (UAE), Cycling (PHI), Squash (MAS), Waterski (JPN) and Woodball (TPE).

For 2018 already 35 championships are attributed.

### 33 World University Championships

Indeed, looking back at this championship year, FISU events were hosted worldwide with a much anticipated return to the continent of Oceania, with the WUC Sailing organized in Perth, Australia. The NUSF of the Philippines hosted its very first FISU event with the 7<sup>th</sup> World University Cycling Championship taking place in Tagaytay. New sports appeared on the championship programme as well, with inaugural editions of Sport Climbing and Ski Orienteering being successfully hosted in Shanghai, China and Tula, Russia respectively. Another Sport is getting ready to enter



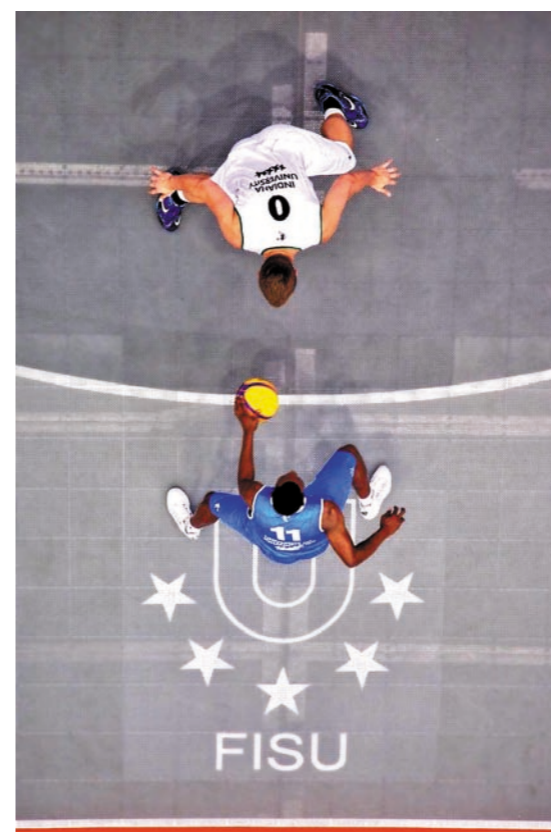
### World University League

This year also saw a second edition of the World University League of 3x3 Basketball. The inaugural FISU World University League was the 3x3 Basketball organised in Xiamen (CHN) in 2015 in partnership with FIBA, the international governing body of that sport. The unique concept in the inception of this event was the competition between university teams, rather than between national teams. FISU envisions establishing global events for university teams in key sports, with specific partnerships involving International Sports Federations and seeking to establish synergies and maximise the potential of the University Sports movement. In comparison with the 2015 edition, this year's edition has been extended to include more in-depth participation from Continental Associations (FISU Associate



Members) in the organisation of qualifying tournaments. This year's event took place from 21<sup>st</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup> October in Xiamen, China. The 2016 European Universities Games held in Zagreb and Rijeka served as the qualifying tournament for the old continent and saw an excellent level of competition between teams that fought for the best places. In the women's competition, 13 teams faced each other to earn one of the two precious tickets to Xiamen, and in the end, the Lithuanian Sport University and the University of Ljubljana representing two countries famous for their basketball history, earned the sought-after tickets. In the men's tournament, 22 teams competed and again, no surprise to find a Serbian and a Croatian team in the final. The University of Kragujevac – host of the 1<sup>st</sup> FISU World University 3x3 Championship in 2012 – and the University of Split guaranteed their places by reaching the final of the EUSA Games. In Asia, Macau hosted the 2<sup>nd</sup> Asian University 3x3 Championship from 20<sup>th</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup> July and in total 22 teams took part to the event (12 men and 10 women teams). After four days of intense competition, the host team – the University of Macau – managed to qualify for the final in the company of the Payame Noor University (IRI) in the men's competition. In the women's tournament, China and Thailand placed their women's team in the final with Peking University and Sripatum University respectively. The qualifiers from Oceania came

from two tournaments held in New Zealand and Australia. The 2016 Unibattle took place in Gold Coast from 11<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> May with 4 women's and 11 men's teams participating. The University of Sydney earned gold in both tournaments, edging out their opponents in the respective finals and earning the spots for Xiamen. Five universities participated in the New Zealand qualifier, with the Auckland University of Technology claiming the men's title and the University of Auckland winning the women's tournament. The city Johannesburg received the 8th All Africa University Games with 3x3 Basketball included in the programme. In the men's tournament, University of Johannesburg (RSA) and Makerere University (UGA) booked their tickets to the 3x3 FISU League final. The women's tournament saw National University of Science & Technology (ZIM) join Makerere University (UGA) again to complete the African representation in Xiamen. Four



universities were appointed to represent FISU America: Universidad Nacional de La Matanza (ARG) and Universidad de Carabobo (VEN) in the men's tournament, and UNINASSAU – PE (BRA) and University of Regina (CAN) in the women's. The women's tournament was completed by the Tianjin University of Finance and Economics (CHN), the 2015 women's winners and the wild card team Université de Nantes (FRA). In the men's, two wild card teams complete the roster are McGill University (CAN) and the NCAA Div. I and Big Ten Conference team, Indiana University (USA). In the Women's Final, Lithuanian Sports University (LTU) faced the University of Regina (CAN). At the very beginning, the girls of Regina led the game. Both teams played hard for any possible advantage they could get. The team of Lithuanian Sports University attacked efficiently, and then eventually reached the top of the podium with the score of 21 to 14. An epic scene was repeated in the Men's Final. University of Bordeaux (FRA) met a Canadian team again. Both teams performed well, but McGill University (CAN) took the lead after a few minutes. The Frenchmen tried to score, but it was not easy, especially under the pressure of a tight defence from McGill University. The French team was defeated, and the trophy went to Canada the second year in a row.

### FISU present at the 79<sup>th</sup> AIPS Congress

A FISU delegation was present at the 79<sup>th</sup> AIPS Annual Congress which was hosted in Doha, Qatar from 7<sup>th</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup> February, 2016. FISU President Oleg Matytsin presented the vision and values of FISU and gave an update of FISU future activities



to the representatives of the International Sports Press. He was accompanied by FISU First Assessor and Chair of the FISU Media and Communication Committee Verena Burk.

### FISU at UNESCO's Meeting for Sport

As a member of the permanent consultative committee (PCC) of the Intergovernmental Committee for Physical Education and Sport (CIGEPS), FISU attended the joint meeting of PCC with the CIGEPS held on 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> February, 2016 in Monaco. Kolë Gjelošhaj, Director of Educational Services represented FISU. The FISU report underlined the adoption by the UNESCO General Conference on the 'International Day of University Sport' to be celebrated on 20<sup>th</sup> September.

### IOC and FISU pledged closer ties in Presidential Meeting

FISU President Oleg Matytsin met with IOC President Thomas Bach in Lausanne on Monday 7<sup>th</sup> March to discuss the potential for even closer cooperation between the two sports organisations for the benefit of University sport worldwide. The meeting was held at IOC Headquarters. President Matytsin updated President Bach on his first four months in

office and reported on the key outcomes of the recent Executive Committee meeting from 4<sup>th</sup> - 5<sup>th</sup> March in Brussels. President Matytsin also gave an update to President Bach on FISU's continued process of aligning its operations with Olympic Agenda 2020. IOC President Thomas Bach commented after the meeting: "University sport is hugely important. Having competed in two Universiades myself in Moscow 1973 and in Mexico City 1979, I know that University sport encourages students to pursue excellence in mind, body and lifestyle making it a great tool for developing future leaders in society. Under the Presidency of Oleg Matytsin FISU has made great progress particularly in relation to adopting the recommendations of our reform programme Olympic Agenda 2020. FISU is a strong and reliable partner for the IOC and I hope that we will increase the mutual cooperation between our organisations over the next four years." President Matytsin

said: "I am very grateful to President Bach for his strong words of encouragement and his intention for the IOC to engage even more with FISU's initiatives and events. FISU's mission is to act for the health and wellbeing of students around the world and thereby help them to become tomorrow's leaders. The IOC's support for our work is greatly received."

### FISU Executive Committee Meetings

The Executive Committee met twice in 2016, in Brussels (March) and Taipei City (October). At its Executive Committee meeting that took place in Brussels from 4<sup>th</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup> March 2016, the FISU Board voted to develop a strategic plan to guide its operations over the next 10 years. The meeting included discussions and presentations across all areas of FISU's activities. Each FISU stakeholder will have the opportunity to provide input on the

FISU Strategy and each will be relied upon to implement it as well. At the meeting in Brussels, the Executive Committee also re-defined the age limits for students competing at FISU-owned sports events. From 2018, students competing in a FISU-owned sports events must be aged between 17 and 25.

At the 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting in Taipei City, the ongoing preparations for both the Winter Universiade 2017 in Almaty (29<sup>th</sup> January



- 8<sup>th</sup> February) and the Summer Universiade 2017 in Taipei (19<sup>th</sup> - 30<sup>th</sup> August) were the focus of the discussions, with the Executive Committee concluding that both Organising Committees are on track to deliver two excellent events.

### Universiades attributed

Lucerne in Switzerland will stage the 2021 Winter Universiade after the FISU Board awarded the hosting rights to the city during its Executive Committee meeting in Brussels. The decision was taken following a positive report given by FISU's Winter Universiade Evaluation Committee on the findings from its visit to Lucerne in February.

On 17<sup>th</sup> June, 2016, a delegation of the Naples 2019 SU Organising Committee comprised of Fulvio Bonavitacola, Vice President of Region Campania; Lorenzo Lentini, CUSI President; Antonio Dima, CUSI Secretary General and Almerina Bove, lawyer from Region Campania visited the FISU HQ in Lausanne to meet its President Oleg Matytsin and Secretary General/CEO Eric Saintrond and to sign the Attribution Contract for the 30<sup>th</sup> Summer Universiade in 2019. The project of the Universiade in Naples is a unique concept and will provide a fantastic legacy to

the local community and for the development of youth and sport in a very sport-oriented region with a large student community. The project also benefits from the great support of the Italian central government and Prime Minister Renzi, of all the universities in Italy, and also receives the active involvement of CUSI and a full support from CONI. The Universiade in Naples in 2019 will be a fantastic opportunity for FISU, CUSI and Italy to celebrate the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of FISU which was founded in 1949 in Merano and the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first Universiade which was organised in Turin in 1959. Italy and CUSI have always played a significant role in the promotion and development of the University Sport Movement having hosted six Winter Universiades and four Summer Universiades. This confirms the strong support of the country to the values of sport and education that are symbolised by the FISU motto: "Excellence in Mind and Body" and "Today's Stars, Tomorrow's leaders". FISU is convinced that, with the full involvement of the Campania Region and under the leadership of its President, Vincenzo De Luca, the Universiade in the Campania Region will be a fantastic project for the young generations, the local community and the entire country.

### FISU President Matytsin attends Stone Laying Ceremony FISU's New HQ

FISU President Oleg Matytsin participated in a Stone Laying Ceremony at the site of the Synathlon building in Lausanne, which will become the home of FISU's headquarters from January 2018. The Synathlon building will unite four separate and complimentary organisations:

FISU, ThinkSport, the Institute of Sports Science of the University of Lausanne (ISSUL) and the International Academy for Sports Science and Technology (AISTS). Each organisation will occupy individual workspaces, offices and meeting rooms and share access to a central hub of communal spaces, including an auditorium, four classrooms and a cafeteria. At the Stone Laying Ceremony President Matytsin delivered a short speech in which he outlined the purpose of the Synathlon building and praised the project's key stakeholders.

*"This building will unite education, university sport, sport science and technology under one roof. In this way, it is more than just a building; it is a monument to the idea that athletes should always be able to pursue 'dual careers'. The Synathlon will help athletes pursue sporting and intellectual goals side-by-side in an environment that promotes fair play, ethics and good governance",* President Matytsin said. *"Today is about recognising and thanking the people who have worked so hard to make the construction of this building a living reality. On behalf of all those who will work, study and benefit from the Synathlon, I would like to thank everyone at the Canton de Vaud, ThinkSport, the Institute of Sports Science of the University of Lausanne, the International Academy for Sports Science and Technology and FISU for making this project a reality."* FISU's current headquarters are in the Maison du Sport International in Lausanne.

### Almaty hosted Heads of Delegation Meeting

The Organising Committee of the 28<sup>th</sup> Winter Universiade in Almaty, Kazakhstan recently hosted the traditional Heads of Delegation meeting. The international guests visited all venues of the 2017 Winter Universiade, which are the 'Sunkar' International Ski Jumping Complex, 'Baluan Sholak' Sports Palace, 'Almaty Arena' (new venue), 'Halyk Arena' (new venue), 'Medeu' High-mountain Ice Rink, 'Shymbulak' Ski Resort, 'Alatau' Cross-country Skiing and Biathlon Stadium 'Tabagan' Ski Resort. Furthermore, the delegates had the opportunity to get acquainted with the living conditions provided for the athletes in the Athletes' Village and received answers to all relevant questions. The delegates also took part in the draw for team sports and the Opening Ceremony of the ice palace 'Almaty Arena'. They also attended a Gala concert dedicated to the 1,000-year anniversary of the city which was hosted in the Arena.

### International Day of University Sport

The 'International Day of University Sport' (IDUS) will



be celebrated annually on 20th September. It is officially proclaimed by the United Nations Education, Science and Culture Organisation (UNESCO). Among others, the day aims at confirming the importance of sport in universities and the role of universities in the community as responsible actors for consolidating and developing quality physical and sport education at the service of citizens. Each year on 20th September, thanks to its network of university associations, clubs and partners, FISU will mobilise the academic world. The events will propose leisure sport activities, competitions, discussion workshops and cultural happenings to citizens of all ages. IDUS falls within the framework of a multidisciplinary educational project insisting on the need for physical and sport education programmes, sports facilities and scientific studies in universities, with the purpose of fostering social inclusion, minorities integration and anti-doping, combating non-communicable diseases and the ongoing development of scientific research in the field of physical education and sport, taking into consideration the acquisition and transfer of knowledge as well as, and above all, social and economic policy at the local,

national and international levels. FISU Member Associations and the countries member of UNESCO are invited to celebrate this day based on tailor-made events according to their culture and specific needs with the focus that sport is not to be taken out of universities and left to the initiative of the private sector because sport must be fully integrated in higher education and research structures, taking its rightful place in multidisciplinary strategies. All the different partners including universities and municipalities will join efforts to also organise the FISU Festival in the heart of their cities. FISU actively promoted this Day with its 170 National University Sport Federation. Different types of sport, educational and cultural events were organised on the five continents. To these manifestations we have to add that three Festivals that are multi activity and sports events open to the citizens and not only to students were hosted in the cities of Lausanne, Oslo and Melbourne on the Monash University Campus. Among others, the day aims at confirming the importance of sport in universities and the role of universities in the community as responsible actors for consolidating and developing quality physical and

sport education at the service of all citizens. - #IDUS2016

### 13<sup>th</sup> FISU Forum

The 2016 FISU Forum was hosted in Montpellier, France from 4th to 9th July. Main theme of the Forum was 'From the Origins to the Future of University Sport', discussed by the representatives of 49 countries and regions. At the closing, OC President Arnaud Richard addressed the audience by reflecting on this main theme: "Innovation and future is now, I think that's what we have showed during this Forum." Verena Burk, FISU First Assessor and EduC Chair added: "For the first time in the FISU history the institutional partners of FISU, such as UNESCO, the European Commission, the Council of Europe, WADA, the European Athlete as Student Network and Eurosport were all present and had a significant role in presenting topics which not only are related to each other but also have a high importance in FISU and National University Sport Federations. Such an event could not take place without teamwork, enthusiasm and friendship, and I have watched all three in action during this week." As a Forum tradition two participating students were then invited to go to the 2017 FISU Conference in Taipei City. Seingsaw Lertratanachai from Thailand and Bennie Wardi from Finland were rewarded for their outstanding work in Montpellier. The next Forum will be hosted in Krasnoyarsk, Russian Federation. "When you see FISU as a body that is only existing in order to provide opportunities to win medals at the Universiade that is a completely wrong image. Universities are able to create a completely different image of FISU, as being university community, as being involved in community to change



the world through sport and physical activity. Because that's the role of FISU," said Alexander Schischlik, Chief of Youth and Sport Section of UNESCO, at the Opening Ceremony. After six days of fruitful exchange, networking and learning experience the participants of the 2016 FISU Forum will spread exactly this message all over the world.

### MoU Signing moves FISU and IOC towards Closer Collaboration

On 9<sup>th</sup> November 2016, FISU and the International Olympic Committee (IOC) signed a Memorandum of Understanding at the International Federation Forum in Lausanne, formalising an era of closer collaboration and confirming areas of mutual interest within student sport. The MoU outlined three specific areas that will drive FISU's relationship with the IOC moving forward. Firstly, both organisations will work to develop a dual career programme. This programme will help ensure that athletes' sporting successes are complemented by academic attainment, which will serve as the foundation of their careers after their time as elite sportsmen and women. Secondly, FISU and the IOC will draw on their respective experience from the Universiades and the Olympic Games to share best practice in sports competition management. Thirdly, FISU expects to maximise the contribution of universities to the Olympic Movement through sports development and also

through research. "Today's MoU signing is a fitting conclusion to what has been a highly rewarding first year as FISU President. This agreement will help deliver a brighter future as FISU and the IOC work together to share expertise and connect young people to the benefits of sport and the values of Olympism. With the continued collaboration of the Olympic Movement, I have no doubt that university sport will play an ever-greater role in shaping tomorrow's leaders", FISU President Oleg Matytsin said. Forging a closer relationship with the IOC was an integral pillar of FISU President Oleg Matytsin's presidential election campaign in 2015. As well as today's MoU signing, FISU has shown its commitment to this collaboration over the past year by placing the Olympic Agenda 2020 at the heart of its 10-year Strategy, which is currently being developed by specialist working groups made up of National University Sport Federations (NUSFs), Continental University Sports Federations (CUSFs), students, the FISU Secretariat, universities,

International Sports Federations and partners. "The IOC is pleased to partner with FISU and the other organisations that help shape young people's direct experiences of sport and of friendly international competition", IOC President Thomas Bach said. "The IOC acknowledges the important role that FISU plays in the field of education through sport and the leadership of the organisation in the development and promotion of international university sport. FISU and universities play a vital role in using sport to connect young people with the Olympic values of friendship, respect and excellence. Universities also help ensure that elite athletes are well-rounded individuals who have developed their skills both on and off the field. I am confident that this MoU will mark a long and fruitful collaboration with FISU." The MoU signing comes ahead of an important year for FISU: from 29<sup>th</sup> January to 8<sup>th</sup> February 2017, the 28<sup>th</sup> Winter Universiade will take place in Almaty, while the 29<sup>th</sup> Summer Universiade in Taipei will run from 19<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> August 2017.



# FISU Continental Associations



European University Sports Association (EUSA)

Established in 1999, European University Sports Association (EUSA) is one of the associate members of the International University Sports Federation (FISU), as the continental governing body for university and higher education sport in Europe.

Reflecting back to the year 2016,

one of the key steps for EUSA was the General Assembly in Wroclaw, where representatives of member organisations elected the new Executive Committee. Mr Adam Roczek (POL) was re-elected as the President, with Mr Kemal Tamer (TUR) and Mr Haris Pavletic (CRO) as Vice-Presidents, and Mr Lorenz

Ursprung (SUI) as the Treasurer, electing also 11 other members of the board. Members of the Executive Committee are also Mr Matjaz Pecovnik, Secretary General, and the current Chair of the Student Commission. Before the start of the General Assembly, EUSA Forum was organised in the Centennial Hall

in Wroclaw on April 8, focusing on University Sport in Europe and the European Universities Games. Apart of the 2016 and 2018 Games, also the bidding cities of the 2020 Games presented their candidatures, and the 5th European Universities Games in 2020 were attributed to Belgrade (SRB).

The third edition of our European Universities Games also importantly marked the year 2016 for EUSA. The event, held between July 12 and 25, hosted in Croatian cities Zagreb and Rijeka, was the greatest and biggest so far. More than 5,000 participants representing over 400 universities from 40 European countries competed in 21 sports - Badminton, Basketball, Basketball 3x3, Beach Volleyball, Bridge, Chess, Football, Futsal, Golf, Handball, Judo, Karate, Rowing, Rugby 7's, Sport Climbing, Table Tennis, Taekwondo, Tennis and Volleyball, with Swimming and Water Polo as demonstrative sports. For the first time in the history of the EUSA sports events, students with disabilities competed at the Games as well in para swimming and para table tennis competitions. Apart from the competitions, participants enjoyed also accompanying social and entertainment, as well as educational activities. Especially important was also the Rector's Conference which was held in the



days before the official opening of the Games. The importance of the Games and accompanied events was also shown by official receptions, hosted by the Croatian Prime Minister, President of Croatia and Mayors of the hosting cities.

Several competitions were broadcasted live on TV and streamed online, and a lot of attention and interest was given also to the Opening and Closing ceremonies, both from the media, as well as from general public. The Games officially opened at the packed Mladost Stadium in Zagreb on July 13 in the evening with a fantastic opening ceremony. After the march pass, participants and the organizers of the 1987 FISU Summer Universiade carried the EUSA flag, passing it

to the second group, consisting of several Croatian trophy-winning athletes. Before the oaths were taken, the attendees were addressed by the president of the European Universities Games Zagreb – Rijeka 2016 Mr Zrinko Custonja, the Rector of the University of Zagreb Mr Damir Boras, the President of the European University Sports Association Mr Adam Roczek and the Croatian Prime Minister Mr Tihomir Oreskovic. EUSA President Roczek recalled the famous FISU Universiade in 1987 and thanked the organizers of the Games in Zagreb and Rijeka. Legacy of that Universiade was confirmed also by the presence of FISU President Mr Oleg Matytsin. At the closing ceremony, representatives of all key partners were present. Organising Committee of the European Universities Games Zagreb-Rijeka 2016 (EUG2016) and the European University Sports Association (EUSA) thanked everyone for their contribution in making the Games a success. Event concluded with the lowering of the EUSA flag, accompanied by the live performance of the Gaudeamus Igitur anthem. The EUSA flag was then passed to the representatives of the organisers of the next European Universities





## Federation of African University Sports

Games, which will take place in July 2018 in Coimbra, Portugal.

EUSA was again recognised by the European Commission as one of the official partners of the European Week of Sport, aimed to promote sport and physical activity across Europe. The dates of the second edition of the event ran from September 10 onwards, with a range of activities and events taking place across Europe, encouraging people to #BeActive. On 15 September, the European Commission hosted in Brussels a conference on good governance in sport as the flagship event. Among the issues discussed, a declaration on good governance was presented, inviting sport bodies to pledge their support and commit to promote and implement basic principles of good governance in sport: integrity, transparency, accountability, democracy and inclusivity. We are happy and proud to report that EUSA was one of the first signatories of the declaration.

EUSA's attention during the European Week of Sport was focused on the EUSA Convention

that took place in Bled, Slovenia between September 22 ad 25, and on the celebration and promotion of the International Day of University Sport (IDUS) on September 20.

Other projects, co-funded also by FISU and EU, included the EUSA international volunteer programme, photo competition, exhibition on university sport, European Volunteer Service (EVS) and participation in other projects, including the Strengthening Coaching with the Objective to Raise Equality (SCORE), Voices for Truth and Dignity (VOICE) and other projects and initiatives.

2017 will be focused on European Universities Championships, bi-annual EUSA Conference, realisation of the International Day of University Sport, European Week of Sport and other

activities and social responsibility projects. Our championships in 19 sports will be organised in 14 cities throughout Europe, at which more than 4,000 participants are expected to take part. EUSA is proud of the fact that all events are open for men and women, students aged 17-30, representing their universities across Europe. We also invite you to attend our Conference on Fostering Inclusion and Well-being through Sport, and the annual Gala, honouring the best, to be organised in Coimbra, Portugal on April 7 and 8, 2017.

### 8<sup>th</sup> FASU Games

The 8<sup>th</sup> FASU Games opened on 26 June 2016 on the campus of the prestigious University of Johannesburg. The event was jointly organized by the University of Johannesburg, the Tshwane University of Technology, University Sport South Africa (USSA) and the African University Sports Federation (FASU). For the first time in FASU history, athletes competed in university teams instead of national teams. Around 700 athletes from 44 universities representing 14 countries participated in the

games in 10 sport categories: athletics, badminton, basketball, 3x3 basketball, chess, football, netball, tennis, table tennis and volleyball. The colourful Opening Ceremony started with the flag procession, followed by the national anthem of South Africa and the welcome addresses of the hosts. To name a few, the ceremony was attended by Prof. Angina Parekh, Acting Vice-Chancellor of the University of Johannesburg, Parks Tau, Mayor of Johannesburg, Ilhaam Groenewald, Vice-President of USSA and Malumbete Ralethe, President of FASU. FISU President Oleg Matytsin

underlined the importance of education and communication through university sport and encouraged students to play an active role in society, respecting rules and fair play. He offered a FISU plaque to the President of the Organising Committee, Ms Nomsa Mahlangu, and to Mr Malumbete Ralethe, in recognition of their contribution to university sport. In return, President Matytsin received a statue of Nelson Mandela from Prof. Angina Parekh, symbolizing the values shared across the university sports movement worldwide, such as the importance of educating

the youths to prepare them for the challenges to come. He also received a gift from Malumbete Ralethe, who said that it was a great honour to welcome him at the FASU Games.

The 8<sup>th</sup> FASU Games officially came to a close on 2 July 2016 at the University of Johannesburg, South Africa, with the attendance of 35 Universities from 9 countries representing 3 regions of Africa. Tshwane University of Science and Technology won the Overall Trophy for Institutions while South Africa was the champion in the national category. FASU President Malumbete Ralethe expressed gratitude to the host and to the participants.

### 4 Teams Qualified for World Universities 3x3 Basketball League

After fierce competitions, 4 teams from 3 universities and 3 countries were qualified to represent Africa at the 2<sup>nd</sup> edition of the World Universities 3x3 Basketball League held from 21 to 23 October 2016 in Xiamen, China. The Teams per gender were qualified after reaching the finals of the 8<sup>th</sup> FASU Games 3x3 Basketball competition that took place at the University of Johannesburg basketball courts. In the men's category, University of Johannesburg (South Africa) won the finals against Makerere University (Uganda), while University of Ghana, Legon(Ghana) took the third place. The women category was won by Makerere University



(Uganda) against National University of Science and Technology (Zimbabwe) and University of Johannesburg (South Africa) won the bronze medals.

### 18<sup>th</sup> CUCSA Games 2016

The 18<sup>th</sup> Edition of the Games of Confederation of University and College Sports Association of Zone VI (CUCSA) was held from 1 to 6 August, 2016 with in Bulawayo-Zimbabwe. 8 of the 10 member countries including; Angola, Botswana, Lesotho, Madagascar, Malawi, Mozambique, South Africa, Zambia, Zimbabwe competed for the overall awards in 9 sports including athletics, basketball, chess, football, netball, karate, table tennis, tennis and volleyball. This year, the Games were organized under the theme: "Regional Integration Through



Sports".

### FASU Executive Committee Meeting

The Executive Committee of FASU held a two-day meeting in Kampala, Uganda at the FASU Secretariat from 29 to 30 September, 2016. In the opening session, FASU President Mr. Malumbete Ralethe stressed the aim for self-sufficiency to ensure that the activities would be carried out properly. The Executive Committee discussed various issues, including minutes from previous meeting and matters arising, reports from the Secretariat and FASU Zones, as well as membership and sub-committees. Meanwhile The Executive Committee also considered applications for hosting the 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> FASU Games 2018, 2020 and 2022 respectively.



### Ethiopia's Mekelle University to Host the 9<sup>th</sup> Africa University Games 2018

The FASU Executive Committee unanimously authorized the hosting right of the 9<sup>th</sup> FASU Games in July 2018 to Mekelle University from Ethiopia at its meeting on 30 September 2016, after a long bidding process which was open to all universities across Africa, as well as on recommendation of their National University Sports Federations. The President of Ethiopian Public University Sports Association (EPUSA) Mr. Abbay B. Kidane, and Dr. Kesatie Legesse Habtemariam from Mekelle University also presented their bid, expressing their readiness to host Africa University Games. The Executive Committee of FASU would decide the hosts of the 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> editions Games (2020 and 2022 respectively) at next EC meeting.

### Eastern Africa University Sports Federation holds Elective General Assembly

The Eastern Africa University Sports Federation (EAUSF) held Elective General Assembly on 20 May, 2016 at the main auditorium



The Assembly also amended the constitution to include two students (one male & one female) to the Executive Committee. The New Executive Committee shall serve a four year term until 2020.



of the University of Rwanda in Kigali Rwanda. The meeting was one of Africa's 5 Zonal University Sports Federations. In the opening session, the head of the host NUSF, Mr. Albert Kayiranga thanked members of Eastern Africa for turning up in his beautiful country and expressed his best wished for them. FISU Assessor and FASU Secretary General Peninnah Aligawesa Kabenge, together with FASU 2nd Vice President Jacob Stanley Nteere appreciated the work that zonal federation has done to promote university sports and encouraged them to keep up the spirit. While donating FISU Flags to NUSF members and EAUSF, they encouraged the receivers to display these flags at all their events and aspire to keep participating in the continental and international sports events as well.

Mr. Cyriaco Kabagembe, who is also the Dean of Students at Makerere University, was elected as the President again unanimously and Dr. Simon Munayi from the University of Nairobi remained his position as General Secretary as well.

### 10<sup>th</sup> Eastern African University Games Kicked off in Nairobi



The 10<sup>th</sup> Eastern Africa University Games kicked off on 16 December at Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT) and Kenyatta University in Nairobi Kenya with the participation of 43 universities from Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania and Rwanda. With 18 sport categories, most competitions were held at JKUAT grounds while others at Kenyatta University from 16 to 22 December.

# Pan-American University Sports Federation

## FISU America History

Most American countries engaged in the university sports long time ago, but there were few continental events. Both FISU and American countries realized the urgency to establish a continental university sports federation in this large continent. On 11<sup>th</sup> June 2007, representatives from North America, Central America, Caribbean area and South America met in Blumeneau, Brazil. As the most important achievement of that meeting, a Pan-American University Sports Organization came into being, and was known as Organización Deportiva Universitaria Pan-Americana (ODUPA). Mr. Julio Jakob, Uruguayan COUDS chair, was elected as the 1st President.

Since its establishment, ODUPA devoted in providing a platform for all university students in America and to exchange and interact through sports.

In 2011, during the 25<sup>th</sup> Winter Universiade, the Electoral General Assembly was held in Belgrade, Serbia. Sotero Vázquez from Dominican Republic was elected as the President. But ODUPA didn't have any progress in the following years, until in 2014, an interim Executive Committee was elected under the aegis of FISU, in which FISU Vice President Mr.

Luciano Cabral from Brazil was chosen to be the new ODUPA President. Under his leadership, ODUPA had hosted various activities and developed on a fast track.

In 2016, a new Executive



Committee was elected in Sao Paulo, Brazil. Mr. Alim Maluf from Brazil was elected as the fourth President, and following his proposal, the name of the organization was changed into FISU America.

**Development Committee:**  
 It is responsible for studying the possibility of proposed projects and developing new members or associated members.

**Education Committee:**  
 It promotes university sports through organizing conferences, trainings, congresses, forums, courses and other academic activities.

**Communication and Marketing Committee:**  
 It analyses and generates communicational and marketing politics. Another mission is to set up the broadcasting system to cover the activities organized by FISU America and its member associations.

**Sports Events Committee:**  
 It is responsible for implementing all the sports-related events organized by FISU America.

**Legal Committee:**  
 It provides legal advice to the problems raised by FISU America Executive Committee.

**Gender Equality Committee:**  
 It advises the Executive Committee on suitable policies to be developed, to encourage, support and improve the promotion of women in sport at all levels and in all structures, with a view to implement the principle of equality between men and women, thus fully representing the values of university sport and those of our modern society in the continent of America.

**Assessor Committee:**  
 It is an advisory body in management of the Executive Committee of FISU America, which is integrated by FISU's executive committee members that belongs to American sport community.

## 2016: A Big Year for FISU America



In 2016, 4 world university championships were held in America, which is a remarkable record. They are:  
 WUC Futsal – Goiania (BRA)  
 WUC American Football - Monterrey (MEX)  
 WUC Netball – Miami (USA)  
 WUC Weightlifting – Mérida (MEX)

From FISU America alone, nearly 2000 student athletes participated. Of course the championships couldn't be so successful without

the support from other continental partners and participations from countries/regions all over the world.

In this year, Honduras organized the Central America University Sport Games (JODUCA 2016), which attracted six Central America countries taking part in. In the Southern America region, Argentina hosted the South America University Sport Games (JUSBA2016) with the participation of seven countries.

## Outlook in 2017

FISU America Executive Committee determined to officially launch Pan American University Championships. Four events are scheduled in 2017.

- Pan American University Chess Championship in Caracas, Venezuela.
- Pan American University 3x3 Championship in Buenos Aires, Argentina.
- Pan American University Futsal Championship in Santa Catarina, Brazil.
- Pan American University Beach Volley Championship in Costa Rica.

In the academic field, FISU America's Forum 2017, which is also the first Pan American University Sport Congress, will be held in conjunction with the chess championship in Caracas, Venezuela.

### Governance

The FISU Oceania administrative and finance requirements continued to be met through guidance from Don Knapp as the Chair of the FISU Oceania Finance Management Committee along with the assistance from AUS Finance and Administration

### FISU Oceania General Assembly

Held in May on the Gold Coast, Australia, the FISU Oceania General Assembly was attended by all members. While reflecting on the past two years, the General Assembly also provided an opportunity to embrace the focus for future projects and direction for the Oceania region. The General Assembly also endorsed the nomination and subsequent election of Michael White to take the vacant position of Secretary-General and Naomi Ireland to the position of Student Representative.

Prior to the formal General Assembly, FISU guests Mr. Shen Zhen (Vice Chairman of the FISU CDSU) and Laurent Briel (Director Development and Relations FNSU) delivered presentations to the group on NUSF responsibilities and membership requirements as well as FISU activities including the International Day of University Sport and the HELP Program.

Following the General Assembly, FISU Oceania members were invited to participate in the Australian University Sport Conference where delegates were able to hear keynote addresses on topics ranging from economic outlook and sport development to international experiences from the AUS exchange programs.



### FISU Oceania at the 2016 World University Championships

FISU Oceania was well represented at 17 World University Championships in 2016. 70 student athletes represented New Zealand at eight Championships, with the University of Auckland and Auckland University of Technology also qualifying teams for the FISU 3x3 World University League.

## FISU OCEANIA REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM 2016

The FISU Oceania Regional Development program has seen key progress made in the two regions of Samoa and Papua New Guinea. Regional Development Officers have been working to deliver successful programs including the Samoa University Games, International Day for University Sport activities and International Student Day activities. In addition Regional Development Officers have worked closely with local stakeholders to increase the knowledge and awareness of university sport in each country.

### Key achievements for the region in 2016 include

- Successful staging of the Samoa University Games (250 competitors) and Fiji Inter Tertiary Games (1500 competitors)
- International Day for University Sport activities in Port Moresby
- Successful planning for Papua New Guinea University Games although event was cancelled due to political unrest in the country
- MyUnisport workshops held in Papua New Guinea
- Samoa Regional Development Officer attended 2016 Eastern University Games to undertake key operational role. This enabled not only a professional development opportunity, but also a chance to learn skills that can be implemented at future Samoa University Games
- MOU signed with Papua New Guinea Sports Foundation to co-fund Regional Development Officer role based in Port Moresby
- Facebook pages established for Samoa University Games, PNG University Games and Fiji Inter Tertiary Games. These pages are used to increase engagement with local stakeholders and students

At the World University Futsal Championship both the men's and women's New Zealand teams were awarded FISU Fair Play Awards while Barney Gill came home from the World University Karate Championship with a bronze medal in the Men's 67kg Kumite. New Zealand Men's Pair Corey McCaffrey and Louis van Velthooven claimed a silver medal in the World University Rowing Championship.

Australia was represented by 113 student athletes across 15 WUCs in 2016. Being its most successful

year at the Championships, Australia competed for the first time in the World University Netball and Rugby 7s Championships.

Collecting a total of 12 medals throughout the year, Australian athletes won Gold at the Cycling (men's road race), Rugby 7s (men), Rowing (women's single scull), Waterski (men's tricks) and Sailing (open and female).

Australia were also the host to the World University Sailing Championship in Perth in



in conjunction with the Australian University Games.

The University of Sydney won the right to compete at the FISU 3x3 World University League alongside our New Zealand teams with the women's team finishing a credible fourth.



### International University Sport Festival/International Day of University Sport

As only one of three cities around the world to be designated the FISU University Sport Festival status in 2016, the City of Monash together with Monash University played host to Monash in Motion



from 18th to 25th September.

Bringing the campus of Monash University together with the community, 2410 participants took part in six events including one online social media challenge. The event reached a social media audience of 149,000 and raised \$19,406 for MS.

On the 20<sup>th</sup> September, Papua New Guinea reignited university sport by conducting a full day of activities as part of the International Day of University Sport. Students from various institutions in Port Moresby participated in rounds of touch football, volleyball and basketball.

In Samoa, the International Day of University Sport was celebrated on campus with the student union.
